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**DIRECTOR'S REPORT**

Angie Feser, Department Update - highlighted the Parks & Recreation Priorities document included in the agenda packet. There will be commissioner training offered in May, Jurassic Parliament. City Manager recruitment was completed by an agency. Narrowed it to 4 candidates. Interviews, tours and public meetings will take place over a three-day period, Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Candidates will then be discussed at an executive session of Council with the hopes an offer and contract negotiations will begin shortly after. The projection is to have a City Manager in place in early May. Recap of snow and ice event, 1700 hours of overtime from a staff of approximately 25. An appreciation BBQ for the crews took place last Friday. Public outpouring of appreciation was also shared. Staff recruitment Management Analyst and a Parks Maintenance Lead. Earth Day coming up on April 27th.

Anjali Myer, Capital Update - Town Center Plaza project, mini master plan for the notch property at the north end of the Lower Commons Park. Looking for one commissioner to serve on a 4-hour charrette during the day. Hank Klein volunteered. Looking ahead, the discussion highlights will be brought back to the PRC on June 11th and to Council to weigh in on options and proposed plan for the notch property. ESP netting recommendation from PRC to Council was approved and has been sent out for bid. The projection is to have the custom netting ordered and installed by early Spring. In the future, Council would like user groups to contribute to one-off projects proposed. This is a process that will be looked at in the future.

## TOPICS

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### Introductions of Commissioners of the Parks & Recreation Commission and Human Services Commission

Each commissioner shared their name, a little bit of their background and involvement in the City.

### Sammamish Youth Board Annual Report

The SYB leadership presented an overview of the mission and membership. They detailed recent completed projects, attended events and planned projects for the future. The SYB leadership also encouraged both commissions to support and attend SYB meetings or events. They expressed an interest in more involvement and participation in connectivity between the commissions and the SYB.

### Parks & Recreation Department - Overview

The department overview was presented by Angie Feser, Anjali Myer and Chris Jordan. It covered park properties including trails, park planning and land acquisition and then recreation, encompassing events and programming in the community. Park Planning projects include improving existing parks and designing and constructing new parks, preserves and open spaces with amenities to support the mental and physical health of residents and serve a growing community. The Recreation division provides cultural and recreational opportunities, including special events, that promote healthy lifestyles and a sense of community. They manage facility rentals and the City's volunteer program. The Maintenance division provides routine maintenance for our growing parks and recreation facilities to ensure longevity of assets, a positive aesthetic and sensory experience, preservation of habitat and natural systems and safety for park patrons.

### Human Services Commission Presentation

Rita Badh, Human Services Coordinator and Mike Sugg, Management Analyst, presented an overview of the Human Services department and the role of Parks & Recreation in Human Services. Human services in Sammamish are administered through an indirect model, which means the City funds agencies who provide services to residents, instead of the City providing those services directly. These agencies are carefully selected through a competitive grant process. In return, they offer services that are affordable (low cost, adjusted according to income, or free) and accessible. Services provided by the funded agencies vary widely, from cultural navigator programs to domestic violence legal services. In addition to managing the grant program, the Community Services Coordinator connects residents with services, raises awareness of community needs and services, advocates at the regional level, coordinates volunteer opportunities for residents, serves as the City liaison to community groups, and participates in a variety of meetings, programs and events on behalf of the City.

### Collaboration Opportunities Discussion

This discussion was facilitated by Angie Feser and encouraged the joint commissions to answer and brainstorm these two questions: 1. Where might the work of the Parks & Recreation and Human Services Commissions overlap? 2. How might the Commissions work to support and assist each other? A robust discussion followed with feedback being recorded for future referencing and plans to increase the collaborative efforts of commissions' efforts.

### NEEDED FROM COMMISSION:

Should the Parks & Recreation Commission recommend to City Council to consider a proposal for the City of Sammamish to schedule Lake Washington School District athletic fields, within City limits, starting in the Fall of 2019?

### KEY FACTS AND INFORMATION SUMMARY:

Lake Washington School District (LWSD) approached the City of Sammamish (City) to begin scheduling their athletic fields at local Elementary, Middle and High Schools for community use. LWSD is

interested in standardizing procedures, where shared constituents go to reserve fields within the City they live in. The current issue for leagues, organizations and individuals is that they need to contact each individual school to find out availability and to reserve the athletic field on site.

The proposal is for the City to take over scheduling for 11 additional fields within LWSD schools in the City. The fields included are the Varsity and JV Softball field at Eastlake High School, three fields at Inglewood Middle School, two fields at Blackwell Elementary, one field at Carson Elementary, one field at McAuliffe Elementary, one field at Smith Elementary and one field at Mead Elementary. The field types consist of grass, dirt and/or sand, with the exception of the Softball Varsity field which has a synthetic turf infield and a grass outfield. LWSD will continue to provide all maintenance to the fields.

Currently, LWSD does not charge a fee for the use of Elementary or Middle school or fields. With the City taking over the scheduling, LWSD will establish a rental fee for the Eastlake Varsity Softball field. Any rental fee charged for the Eastlake Varsity field and/or other fields would all be returned to LWSD. The City can only establish a processing fee associated with scheduling out the fields.

The City has an Inter-local Agreement (ILA) with LWSD for the Community Fields at Eastlake High school. These fields were built by the City in partnership with LWSD and are maintained by the City and scheduled for a fee by the City. This ILA will have to be amended to include the scheduling at the 11 additional fields.

This proposal by LWSD is not new for the district and region. Currently, City of Kirkland and City of Redmond schedule all LWSD fields except for High School stadiums within their City limits. The City of Redmond started scheduling LWSD fields in Fall 2018. They do not have an hourly charge for fields, but the City of Redmond charges a \$10 processing/administrative fee per contract. LWSD does all the maintenance, but in a very limited capacity, because of their minimal staffing and resources. The transition appears to have been smooth for the City of Redmond. They will be able to provide us with more information once the spring season commences.

The City of Kirkland has been scheduling LWSD fields for a while. In the case of Kirkland, they provide maintenance for a handful of schools for which Kirkland and LWSD had partnered during the original construction or upgrade of the fields. Fields maintained by City charge \$7.00 an hour for residents and \$8.50 for non-residents. Fields maintained by the LWSD are charged \$1.00 an hour for residents and \$1.50 for non-residents. The relationship and partnership with LWSD has worked out successfully for the City of Kirkland, especially, with construction projects.

Launching of the PerfectMind facility software system in the first quarter of this year, would allow for an easy transition and ability for the City to handle additional field scheduling. Additionally, it would be easier for the public to contact one source to schedule a majority of the athletic fields in the City, rather than inquiring into each school individually about the availability of their respective fields. Establishing this partnership with LWSD would strengthen our current relationship with them and provide an opportunity in the future to improve the fields at some of these local schools to maximize their use and provide high quality facilities for the community. This model has been demonstrated by the City of Kirkland through the improvement of several school fields within their city limits and by the

City of Sammamish through their existing partnership with LWSD on the Community Fields at Eastlake High School.

**FINANCIAL IMPACT:**

The financial impact would be a small amount of staff time, however, this can be compensated by adding a processing fee for scheduling the fields through the city.

**OTHER ALTERNATIVES CONSIDERED:**

If not approved, each individual school in the Lake Washington School District would still schedule their own athletic fields.




