**CALL TO ORDER**

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Chair Klein called the Sammamish Parks & Recreation Commission meeting to order at 6:34 PM.

**Recreation Division - 2019 Accomplishments & 2020 Highlights - Chris Jordan, Recreation Manager**  
Chris highlighted changes in the Recreation organization chart, 2019 Special Events, the Volunteer/Restoration program, Waterfront Lifeguard program, Arts Commission, Sammamish Youth Board, the Rental Program and upcoming 2020 highlights.

**Parks Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) Update - Anjali Myer, Deputy Director** Anjali provided a recap of the October PRC meeting which originally introduced an overview of the Parks Capital Improvement Projects (CIP), including the project categories and revenue sources. The list needs updating due to changing priorities, addition of new park properties or partnerships, code modifications and regulation changes. The PRO Plan priorities will be referred to, as the current CIP list is reviewed. Projects will be prioritized for the 2021-2022 budget and costs will be updated accordingly. As a first look, parks planning projects, development and master plans, were reviewed along with other CIP projects which included land acquisitions and less specific park system development. Next steps will be to review design/construction projects in February 2020 and establish general ranking criteria in March 2020.

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#### CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Chair Klein participated in a joint meeting with Lake Washington School District to discuss ball-fields at Inglewood Middle School. The school district is interested in updating the fields in partnership with the City which would increase the availability of playable, scheduled field space. Both Chair Klein and Commissioner Way participated in the Parks, Recreation, Facilities Department meeting which recapped 2019 accomplishments and included participatory team building activities from each division along with a potluck.

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#### DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The two new council members were sworn in at the Jan 7th council meeting, Kent Treen and Ken Gamblin, with Christie Malchow returning. Karen Moran was named Mayor and Christie Malchow was appointed Deputy Mayor. There are three openings on the Parks & Recreation Commission. Six applicants have applied for those positions with another six applicants naming the PRC as a second choice option. Interviews and appointments will take place next week. Council retreat is scheduled in two weeks on January 24th and 25th. Chip Corder, the Deputy City Manager is currently the Acting City Manager while a search is on for an Interim City Manager. We are currently recruiting for the Volunteer Coordinator position with interviewing expected to happen in the last week of January.

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#### PARKS COMMISSION LIAISON REPORTS

**Sammamish Friends - Sid** Sammamish Friends is planning the 2020 Mud Run with its first meeting Mon, January 27th at 7 pm. Sammamish Friends is potentially going to hold a Barn Dance as well in July. The monthly meeting is scheduled for January 13th.

**Sammamish Community Wildlife Habitat - Kathe** Activity with the group has concluded with their participation in two summer farmers market. Some of the participants overlap with the plant steward group so activities tend to overlap as well.

**Native Plant Stewards -Cheryl/Sid** Commissioner Wagner shared that there is now a steering committee for the native plant stewards. The committee has implemented a website, a business card with an email, goals and objectives for their projects. The WNPS group will be planting 5 sequoias at Evans Creek Preserve which were acquired approximately three years ago. WNPS will be offering a program on how to attract birds with native plants on January 25 at the Sammamish Library.

Seeking approval from Commission on proposed placement of the mural.

**KEY FACTS AND INFORMATION SUMMARY:**  
Sammamish Girl Scout Troop #45370, made up of 11 5th grade girls from Mead and Blackwell Elementary Schools, proposes to paint a mural at the Upper Sammamish Commons play structure in an effort to complete their Bronze Award. They are excited to be able to bring a bit more color and life into the world as well.

The Girl Scout Troop presented their proposal to the Arts Commission on Monday, January 27th. The Arts Commission approved the design, location and size of the mural at their meeting. Also, granted the Girls Scout Troop with \$500 to help with supplies and a plaque for the completed work.

**Location:**

The proposed project is to be painted along the wall behind the play structure across from the library, running parallel to 228th Ave SE. See below picture. The size of the wall is 42' x 10' 4" (~462 square feet).

**Proposal for Girl Scout Mural at the Upper Sammamish Commons**

Sammamish Girl Scout Troop #45370, made up of 11 5<sup>th</sup> grade girls from Mead and Blackwell Elementary Schools, proposes to paint a mural at the Upper Sammamish Commons play structure in an effort to complete their [Bronze Award](#). **Location:**

The proposed project is to be painted along the wall behind the play structure across from the library, running parallel to 228<sup>th</sup> Ave SE. See below picture. The size of the wall is 42' x 10' 4" (~462 square feet).



**Cost/Materials:**

Mural will be painted with [Sherwin Williams Pro-Park Waterborne Traffic Marking Paint](#). This is an exterior paint that adheres well to concrete. Use of this paint requires no additional varnish to be applied for color-fastness or cleaning purposes.

The cost of paint and supplies is anticipated to be around \$300.

**Supplies:**

5 gallons of paint (white, black, blue, red, yellow); additional colors to be mixed  
 5 @ \$48.49 = \$242.45

Various paint brushes, drop clothes, etc.

**Preparation:**

Prior to painting, the troop will power wash the surface and apply chalk outlines. Power washing would occur two days to one week before painting. Painting portion is expected to require two weeks to complete and is expected to be done in June 2020.

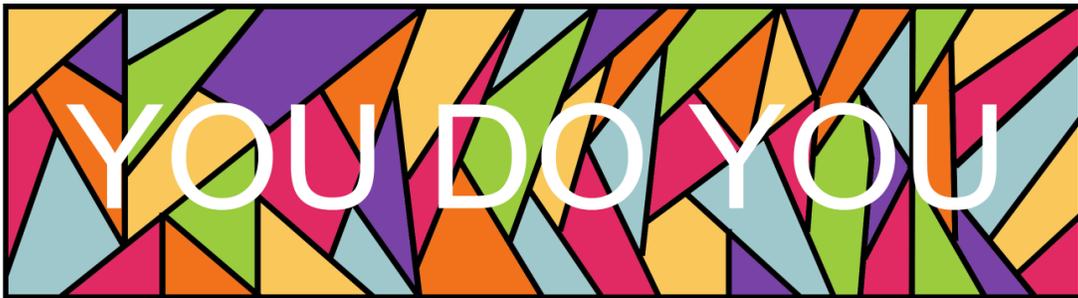
Care would be exercised to keep the playground structure, grass, and adjacent walls paint free through the use of drop cloths, paper, tape, and careful painting methods.

No additional cleanup would be required by grounds crews upon troop exit.

### NEEDED FROM COMMISSION:

Parks Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) Update

### KEY FACTS AND INFORMATION SUMMARY:

At the upcoming meeting, staff will review the rest of the projects on the 2018-2023 Parks CIP. Projects are divided into three (3) categories, Renovation and Development projects, Planning projects and Other projects. At the January meeting, we covered projects under the Planning and Other projects categories. For the February meeting, we will cover projects under the Renovation and Development categories.

### Summary:

The Parks Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) is a planning document, typically updated every two years, that identifies parks capital improvement programs and projects the City foresees undertaking over the next six years. The Parks CIP by itself does not authorize projects to move forward, nor does it authorize funding for any of the listed projects. Funding authorization occurs through the City's biennial budget process.

The Parks CIP implements the vision for the future of park facilities in our City, as well as meeting state requirements for a six-year capital plan that is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan. The plan assures that adequate public facilities are available to serve existing and future development and maintains the City's eligibility for grant funding. The Parks CIP identifies specific improvement projects, funding sources and project timelines over the six-year period. Capital projects may include acquisition, repair, renovation, replacement and development. The updated Parks CIP will include recommended capital projects and proposed schedules which are balanced to accommodate current project priorities, planning, construction seasons and the resources needed to complete the work.

**Timeline:**

The City first adopted a Parks CIP in 2006, the same year the Parks Impact Fees were adopted. The current 2018-2023 CIP is included in and adopted through the 2018 Parks, Recreation and Open Space (PRO) Plan, although it is a stand-alone planning document on its own. We anticipate discussing the Parks CIP Update at the following meetings:

- Meeting #1 – Overview of the Parks CIP Program (October 2019) *Complete*
- Meeting #2a – Review of a subset of current CIP projects, (January 2020) *Complete*
- Meeting #2b – Review of the remaining current CIP projects, additions/deletions (February 2020)
- Meeting #3 – Prioritization of projects, recommendations to City Council (Spring 2020)

**Next Steps:**

At the next Parks & Recreation Commission meeting scheduled in March, we will present the initial findings of the Athletic Field Study. The study aims to increase playing time while emphasizing cost efficiency. This will help prioritize CIP projects related to athletic field improvements. In addition, we will identify any project additions from recent acquisitions etc. Lastly, we will prioritize remaining projects based on current priorities, available resources and the PRO Plan recommendations. The goal will be for the Commission to arrive at a consensus for the updated CIP for recommendation to City Council.

**FINANCIAL IMPACT:**

There is no financial impact at this time. The 6-year Parks CIP is a planning document and as such does not commit the City to any financial obligations. Council will encounter and address the financial impacts in the future as they appropriate funding in the biennial budget for the various projects listed in the 6-year Parks CIP. Listing a project on the Parks CIP allows it to be eligible for grant funding.

**OTHER ALTERNATIVES CONSIDERED:**

An alternative would be to leave the Parks CIP as adopted. The consequence would be that we would be working off an outdated document and priorities would not be clear.
